The Luncheon was a success with a wonderful catered buffet and dessert. Rand Mahoney graciously connected his portable generator so we could have hot coffee and tea!

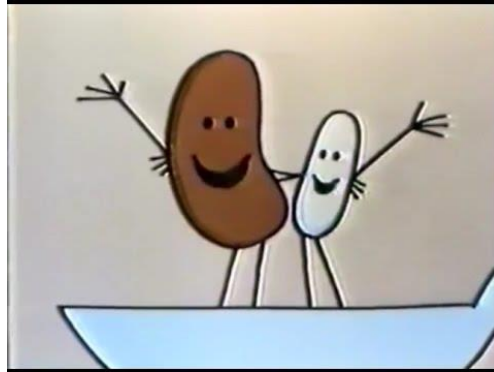

SUNDAY NOVEMBER 17TH, RICE AND BEANS



ON SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 17, JOIN US IN THE PARISH HALL BEFORE OR AFTER THE 10:00 am SERVICE TO BAG RICE AND BEANS

QUESTION: Why do we fill bags with rice and beans and add them to the Christmas Food Boxes?

Several years ago, the staff looked for a way to involve the children in the parish in the Christmas Food Boxes Outreach activity. When we bought presents for the Monument Crisis Center (MCC) families (before 2011), they could help decide on the presents for the children and help wrap the presents. Food boxes made that harder. Lori Robinson came up with the idea of bagging rice and beans and adding it to the boxes. We have continued to do that since then.

QUESTION: Why rice and beans?

Rice and beans is a dish made from a combination of staple foods in many cultures around the world. The grain and legume provide several important nutrients and many calories, and both foods are widely available. Rice and beans are vegetarian and make up a complete protein. *Wikipedia*.

A 1 cup serving of rice and beans has 217 calories and 0.68 grams of fat. It also has 42 grams or 32 percent of an adult's daily intake of energy-providing, complex carbohydrates.

CHRISTMAS FOOD BOXES FOR MONUMENT CRISIS CENTER



Christmas must be coming because St. Timothy's is talking about Christmas Food Boxes! Every year since 2011 parish families have generously donated boxes of food to help feed the client families at Monument Crisis Center (<https://monumentcrisiscenter.org>) during the holiday season. Our goal this year is 215 boxes of food. Gathering and transporting our 200+ boxes is a challenge but imagine the logistics of dealing with 2000+ boxes at the Center! MCC creates a list of the items to put in the boxes so that all have similar content. They ask for \$20 in grocery cards so that the families can buy fresh items to go with the items in the box. Once we "shopped the box", we realized that everything would fit into a small Home Depot moving box. So, we buy all the boxes from Home Depot (who gives us a discount) and buy the grocery cards from a company that will sell us cards that cannot be used for tobacco or alcohol.

We also want to involve everyone in the project so on Sunday, **November 17th** we will gather in the Parish Hall to bag rice and beans to add to our boxes. On **Saturday, November 30th**, a group will gather at the Safeway in Alamo and fill boxes for those who want to pay for someone to fill their boxes for them.

HOW CAN I GET INVOLVED?

- **Come fill bags with rice and beans – Sunday, November 17th** before & after the 10:00 service.
- **Sign up to fill one or more boxes –** Cost: \$23 donation for the grocery card, box, rice and beans.
- **Sign up to have one or more boxes filled FOR you –** Cost: About \$70 for food, box & card.
- Help **fill boxes** at the Alamo Safeway **on Saturday, November 30th** – 9:30 – 11:30 am
- Help load and unload the truck going to Monument Crisis Center on **Saturday, December 7th**
- **Help with Sign-ups** on Sunday mornings in November

OUTREACH GRANTS 2019

Thank you to the members of St. Timothy's Church and to the vestry who once again have been incredibly generous to support our Outreach efforts. Each year St. Timothy's distributes grants to non-profits where a parish member liaison is actively involved. The funds for the grants come from Fruits of the Harvest, Amazon Smile, e-script and the parish operating budget. The "outreach ministries" focus on shelter, homeless services, hunger prevention, mental health, addiction recovery and global health

The 2019 grants are listed below along with the website address and the name of the liaison at St. Timothy's. We allocated a total \$62,450. The grants were voted on by the Outreach Committee and approved by the vestry.

* An additional \$3000 is allocated by the vestry to two schools and the Contra Costa County Interfaith Council.

Shawl Ministry

Saint Timothy's Shawl ministry is composed of individuals who enjoy knitting and crocheting Shawls, Scarfs, Caps, Afghan's, Baby blankets and other items for those in need or would just enjoy a handmade article. Items are blessed during a service before they are delivered. We make Scarf's and caps for the Seaman's Church Institute's (SCI) "Christmas at Sea" program. The SCI Ministry is a part of the International Maritime Center (IMC) in the Port of Oakland. The center is a gathering place for Mariners coming through the Bay Area and Port workers where they can send and receive email play games, visit with volunteer's and get transportation to go shopping. Mariners are on their ships 9-11 months per year and can go for months without setting foot on land.

The center also responds to the spiritual, emotional, and physical needs of seafarers through the chaplaincy program. The Oakland center has a lovely chapel and chaplains from different denominations visit on a regular schedule. Today men and women of the maritime industry improve our lives with the sacrifices thy make to deliver goods from around the world to our homes and workplaces. As in past days hazards and difficulties remain characteristic of the mariners' unique work and way of life.

All are welcomed to be part of this ministry. We always need scarfs, caps, and shawls' I have yarn and patterns. If you find extra yarn in your closet, which is not being used, we would be delighted to accept yarn donations.

Why I Support the Danville Discovery Center

The Danville Discovery Center provides good mental health for people of all ages in the San Ramon Valley through its professional classes and individual support. I'm very proud to be St. Timothy's liaison for this fine organization.

Danville Discovery Center (DDC) first came to my attention when working as a resource specialist at the middle and elementary schools in the San Ramon Valley School District. When faced with troubled students who failed to thrive in their academics, **DDC provided skilled psychology interns who were successful in dealing with anxiety, depression and other disorders.**

Proceeds from the May Devil Mountain Run and the Thrift Station (Crossroads Shopping Center) provide funds for the operation of DDC. The Thrift Station accepts donated items which are assessed, priced and resold in their lovely store. Around ninety volunteers work a couple of shifts a month to staff the store Mondays through Saturdays year round.

Volunteering at the Thrift Station both at the register and preparing items for sale has taught me skills in running a store, but I've learned much more. Most customers are friendly, and some visit the store almost daily to find "a treasure." There are occasional customer problems such as: changing prices on the items, becoming irate if window items aren't available for purchase until the weekend and stealing of merchandise. There are also heartwarming experiences: teens who want to "save the planet" by buying used rather than new clothing to stock their closets, a customer who pays for the next-in-line person's shopping choices and the people who share their excitement about "finding a treasure."

Working at the Thrift Station has given me a whole new set of friends and the opportunity to help others at the same time.

The 170th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of California

The convention was called to order in Gresham Hall on Friday, October 25th at 2:00 PM. , The Rev. Jill Honodel President of the Standing Committee, presiding.

Bishop Marc suffered a stroke earlier in the month. He is now home with his family and is doing well and in good spirits. While he recovers, Bishop Marc remains the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese. Canon Abbott Bailey, Canon to the Ordinary, will be acting on his behalf until he is well enough to return to work.

The Rev. Jill Honodel served as acting President of the Convention in her role as President of the Standing Committee and according to section 4.2 of the Constitution of the Diocese of California. During the Convention reports are presented from elected Committee members, which include : Standing Committee; Executive Council, Committee on Program and Budget ; Committee on Nominations, and Committee on Governance.

In this report, I will comment on the results of the elections. Other reports will follow later.

Treasure of the Diocese- (One lay or Clergy) one year term-Brad Barber, St. Stephens, Orinda;

Standing Committee- One lay and one clergy member, four year terms- Lay- Andrew Han; Clergy –The Rev Matthew Gillett;

Executive Council – Two at least one must be lay- three year terms –Lay nominated from the floor; Clergy- The Rev. Ginger Strickland;

Deputies to The General Convention 2021(June 30th – July 9th, In Baltimore, Maryland) four deputies and 4 Alternates in each order;

Treasurer's Report – October 16, 2019

Financial Highlights

- Pledge income of \$608,416 was based on 144 pledges. An additional 13 pledges were received after the budget was approved, for a total of 157 pledges and \$640,206.
- As of 9/30
 - 37 families have paid their pledges in full for a total of \$191,194.
 - 11 families have not yet made any payments (down from 12 last month) on their pledges of \$25,820.
 - Adjusted or lost pledges of -\$5,920.
- 2019 budget vs actual results, through the end of September, are:

Christian formation expenses \$1,062 under budget.

Children & Youth Ministry expenses \$1,268 under budget.

Fellowship expenses \$2,474 under budget.

Administrative expenses \$3,038 under budget.

Facilities expenses \$4,202 under budget.

Contingency expenses \$7,680 under budget.

Vestry Meeting Highlights – October 2019

The vestry met in Grace House on Wednesday, October 16, at 6:30 pm.

MOTIONS:

The vestry approved 5 motions related to the **benefits offered to employees in 2020**. The benefits are administered by the Diocese of California. This is a regular, annual discussion and action. The following summarizes the motions:

- St Timothy's will pay for the either the Kaiser EPO 80 and the Cigna/Dental/Ortho plans for employees and their dependents who work 30 or more hours a week.
- Employees are responsible for health insurance premiums for over-age children if that changes the tier of their coverage.
- Employees working 20 hours per week or more may purchase health insurance through the plan offered by the Diocese and pay the premiums.
- St. Timothy's pays for employees working 20 hours a week or more to participate in the Employee Assistance Plan (EAP).
- St. Timothy's does not offer a Benefit Waiver Allowance for employees who use a family members health care coverage in 2020.

Outreach Grants – The vestry approved the Outreach grants proposed and approved by the Outreach Committee electronically after the vestry meeting. A total of \$65,450 was granted to 15 charities, 2 schools and the Interfaith Council of Contra Costa County. See the Outreach Grant article for details.

OTHER TOPICS:

- Vestry members are preparing sections of the draft **2020 church budget** related to their commission assignments. The draft budget will be discussed at the November vestry meeting and voted on at the December meeting. The budget may be modified at the January 2020 vestry meeting before being presented to the parish at the annual meeting at the end of January.
- Pastor Todd reported on the first **Sunday 5 pm service** on October 6th. Approximately 75 people attended including some who could not attend in the morning. The next 5 pm service is scheduled for Sunday, November 3rd.
- Pastor Todd and the vestry are working on a new cellphone and newcomer friendly **website**.
- Three **new members of the vestry** will be elected at the January 2020 Annual Meeting. The nominating committee includes Allison Fletcher, Cathy Hager and Lisa Perry.
- The deadline for the **January 2020 Tidings** has been set to December 16th instead of the usual 25th of the month due to the closing of the church office after Christmas.

Parish members are welcome to attend Vestry meetings. The next meeting is on Wednesday, November 20, 2019. The minutes of the vestry meeting will be filed in the Parish Office after they are approved by the Vestry.
