
August 2023 Newsletter of St. Timothy's Episcopal Church Danville, CA

Noah's Ark Update

I want you to know that our teachers are being trained for the upcoming school year. We're looking forward to helping families with their children's continued growth. I have mentioned this before, but TK California is changing the landscape of preschool.

For our ministry to continue into the school year 2024- 2025, we will need some major reorganization including target age groups and what our vital mission is to community.

2023-2024 enrollment is 2/3 of 2022-2023. Noah's Ark may get untenably small — if we continue with business as is. FYI for the next two years, TK California is lowering the age to very young - just turning 4 by Sept 1 in 2025. https://tkcalifornia.org/

I think this is great for California families, and as leaders of Noah's ark we have a chance to figure out how it can be great for families of the future too.

EPISCOPAL YOUTH EVENT (EYE)

I went to EYE 2023 (Episcopal Youth Event) as an adult leader. It took place on the campus of the University of Maryland in beautiful swamp-sweat Baltimore over three days in July. There were about 1100 people of which roughly 1000 were youth. EYE is the second largest event that the Episcopal Church sponsors next to General Convention. I'm not going to describe each component of the event because social media pages do an excellent job of that. Here are a few samples:

If you just went over to Facebook to look at the experience, you saw that it was high energy, full of joy, and full of life. One of the participants told me

that it was the first time they thought the church wasn't just full of old people. As one of those old people (who is also clergy), I was overjoyed to participate and experience vitality in the workshops, group worship, and the preaching. Just hanging out playing cards and talking over meals was pretty excellent too.

I have the vantage point of growing up with church revivals in the 1980's. It was a very different experience from EYE. The 80's were also high energy, but there was a dark edge to them. In those bad ol' days, you worried about your eternal soul, and God was really freaked out by every thought that passed through your head. EYE had all of the good parts of a big revival event, with none of this baggage. It was fully inclusive. The leaders and speakers were diverse in race and class. The calls for political engagement and environmental activism were clear and inviting.

EYE focused on young people figuring out their ministry right now. I heard this refrain more than once, "You're not the church of the future You are the church of now". All people were welcome, all people were leaders, and all people had a voice. I want to specifically thank Caren Miles and The Rev. Maggie Foote from All Soul's Berkeley for the hard work they did leading up to and during the event. Many lay

leaders and clergy from around the country gave so much for this to go so well. As an aside, Caren (diocesan youth missioner) loved riding ebikes, just ask her. Even Spider-Man endorsed EYE on day three (you had to be there).

I'm not writing as a fundraiser, but as somebody who

completely believes that EYE is a part of the vital future we need. Please pray to financially support and give your time to the youth and young adults in the Episcopal Church. They are the church now, and EYE 2026 is almost here.



ABUNDANCE

The sweetness of peaches and the firm red of tomatoes are a glimpse into the abundance of summer. I believe it is one of God's gifts to us as we savor the wonder of prolific gardens and orchards. Can we use moments in everyday summer to give thanks? Can we pray for all our farm workers who toil and produce food for us to eat? Can we be in the moment, encountering the Holy in our daily bread, and extend that graciousness to others in many ways? As our gardens change, and the seasons, including our harvesting garden (The Gary Hunt Memorial Garden), for Monument Crisis Center, we need to pay attention. It is not our toil that brings abundance, it is the power of God's grace in the new creation; meeting Christ in all things changes our perspective. It will allow us to glimpse God in the dried tufts of grass and in the sorrow of never harvested fields. "God with us" is the promise in the difficult times in our lives, the ever changings moments in our communities, and in the changes we can see in the late summer. Christ, let me walk with you and see…and share your abundant Love.

Richard Rohr reflects: The flow of grace through us is largely blocked when we are living inside a worldview of scarcity, a feeling that there's just not enough: enough of God, enough of me, enough food, enough mercy to include and forgive all faults. The problem is exacerbated by the fact that the mind is apparently unable to imagine anything infinite or eternal. So, it cannot imagine an infinite love, or a God whose "love is everlasting" as the Psalms continually shout.

A foundational abundance within reality is clearly exemplified in all of the "multiplication" of food stories in the Gospels, when Jesus feeds a crowd with very little (for example, Matthew 14:15-21). The real spiritual point is grace and not some mere physical miracle. Notice in almost every case, the good old apostles, who represent our worldview of scarcity, advise Jesus against it: "But how will two fish and five loaves be enough for so many?" Jesus is trying to move them from their worldview of scarcity to a worldview of abundance, but does it with great difficulty. In the end there is always much food left over, which should communicate the point: reality always has more than enough of itself to give, it is an inherent overflowing. Observe the seeds, spermatozoa, and pollen of the natural world.

Open me to grace upon grace upon grace.

We are four weeks away from the biggest party of the year to raise funds for all the Outreach Ministries and events that we support.

EARLY BIRD PRICE ENDS IN TWO WEEKS ON THE 28th. The tickets then go from \$45 to \$55, and \$65 at the door, so don't delay. Get your tickets soon.

Why we do this: Over the last 25 years, we have netted over \$845,000 and given out much more in grants with the addition of a church budget allotment and rollover funds. The people who are helped by these beneficiaries can lead a better life with dignity and self-sufficiency and it helps break the cycle of poverty.

Our guest speaker is Deanne Pearn, Executive Director of Hope Solutions. This organization provides low income housing with multi-faceted services and Deanne will give us an idea of the state of homelessness.

Most important is that you go to the **"Helpers Sign Up"** page and see where you can help us with this huge undertaking. This is a parish wide event and we all come together to make this happen. This is great way for newcomers to get involved and meet people. If you can't sign up on on-line, there is a signup sheet on the big rolling bulletin board outside after Sunday services.

Please donate:

We need gift card donations in lieu of gift baskets for the raffles and mini silent auction. These can be for dinners, books, movies, services, car washes, candy, etc.

Donations of wine:

These are needed for the bar; and for the Wall of Wine - W.O. W. (You donate a bottle of wine worth over \$30 and people buy a cork with a number on it for \$25. They then go to the table of wine and match the cork number to a wine bag number.) You can't lose. There were some bottles of wine last year worth \$40 to \$60.

Volunteers needed for "IL BAR":

Mike Brown is our Bar Manager and he needs helpers who can set up and take down, and bartenders who can help in shifts so no one has to be there during the whole event. We have hired a professional RBS bartender to comply with California law but we are helping serve and with setting up and taking down the bar ourselves. By the way, Mike is making Limoncello from scratch and it will be featured in our Limoncello Spritzer signature drink. Our non-alcoholic bar needs a couple more helpers, too.

Dinner at the event

Tania Hansen De Young has arranged for Simple Elegance catering to provide a lovely Italian dinner with appetizers, Chicken Picatta in lemon caper sauce, penne pasta with fresh tomato, basil and garlic sauce, Fresh roasted vegetable medley with balsamic glaze, Caesar salad, focaccia bread, and a delicious dessert.

GARY HUNT PRODUCE PROGRAM

History

The Gary Hunt Product Program was created as a way of providing a Ministry for youth to learn about and care for plants and provide a way of helping families in our community who experience financial difficulties.

In 2017, **Jan M** with the support of other church members erected a raised garden and planted flowers and herbs through funds provided by **Helen R**. We decided to plant herbs in the raised bed because we were concerned about the huge population of deer that would pose problems if we decided to grow anything else. Since **Monument Crisis Center in Concord** accepted canned goods, we tried donating our herbs as well and found out that the herbs were well received, so we decided to harvest the herbs monthly. After a couple of years, the program expanded to other projects where we went into the community to glean trees of church members and even friends of church members as well. Sometimes it may be appropriate to harvest more frequently depending on the weather, but it must be arranged with a driver ahead of time. **Kari D** is the driver. Arrangements can be made with **Sally P** and **Tania D-Y** also.

Harvesting

We harvested 40 1-gallon bags of fennel stems and fronds. No picker tools were required and 2 individuals were able to get it done after making 3 trips. All produce must be bagged in plastic and refrigerated to maintain freshness so produce can be delivered equitably. This process will take at least 2 individuals. Arrangements need to be made in order to do more intense gleaning. Youth make great gleaning helpers. Produce delivery arrangements need to be made ahead of time to assure freshness at the time of delivery.

Nora H has been working on the harvesting and training **Colin H** on herb garden and community harvesting. Together they have harvested 20 gallons of fennel fronds, 5 lbs of plums and 15 bags of St. Timothy herbs. **Pam C** will be providing more training for those interested.

The feedback we have received was very positive. The recipients at Monument Crisis Center were very happy to receive produce from St. Timothys so we hope we can continue this ministry in the years to come.

- St. Timothy's financials show that we are ahead of plan for the first six months of 2023.
- Maintenance reserves now stand at about \$96,500, following major maintenance and repair costs of almost \$168,000 in the first six months. Pledge reserves stand at approximately \$168,000, unchanged since the report for May.
- The Parish is in satisfactory financial shape, assuming that we do not experience significant new maintenance expenses.
