WHY ARE WE DOING THIS? - We are all in this together. We support the work that is done by all the Outreach Ministries because it is what we are called to do.

What we gather at FOTH from your generosity allows us to give grants to 13 organizations who do an incredible job of bettering people's lives. We also actively volunteer for God's Hand's projects (short term projects where busy people can donate or become involved) such as collecting backpacks/school supplies, food, clothing, sheltering homeless in the parish hall, doing meal packing, and many other projects. This is how we give back to those in need. Over the past 25 years of the Fruits of the Harvest, we have netted over \$845.000 and have given out much more with the addition of a church budget allotment and rollover funds.

The people who are helped by these organizations can lead a better life with dignity and self-sufficiency and it helps break the cycle of poverty.

Our ministries have reported that demand for their services has continued to increase greatly during these tougher economic times. Before Covid, Loaves and Fishes served 685 meals per day. Now they are serving 2,100 per day. While our brothers and sisters are in greater need, donations have gone down. They all need our help.

### **HABITAT FOR HUMANITY**

Hope Solutions provides critical services to over 2,200 clients across Contra Costa County, including providing permanent supportive housing to over 1,600 people. Their mission statement is to heal the effects of poverty and homelessness by providing permanent housing solutions and vital support services to highly vulnerable families and individuals. They're working to heal the multi-generational impact of poverty, multi racism, trauma substance use, mental health issues, and inadequate access to healthcare. They provide strong programs for youth success in school.

## **HUNGER PREVENTION & SERVICES**

### LOAVES & FISHES OF CONTRA COSTA

Since 1983, Loaves and Fishes has served more than 5.8 million free, hot and nutritious meals, 210 tons of groceries, and 251,000 meals a year out of 5 dining rooms and a mobile van to those in need. They were named **Nonprofit of the Year** 2023. Their mission is to provide community-based

food programs and partner services that focus on basic needs. They nourish lives! Food is prepared in two off site kitchens.

L & F uses Covid protocols to serve food in to-go containers and bags of groceries and will go to a pilot hybrid program to begin serving in dining rooms and containers. They offer a 12-week free culinary program that teaches basic culinary skills and earns





them a Safety and Sanitation license to qualify for a starting position within the culinary industry.

Demand for food has increased while donations have dropped, which has put L & F in a difficult position. Before Covid they were serving about 685 meals per day...now they are serving about 2,100. They need donations to help with the important work of feeding the hungry.

Since 2003, Monument Crisis Center has provided food and resources to the people from all over Contra Costa County in CrisisCenter Concord. In addition to helping feed 2200 families (over 8000 people) every month, they have a variety of programs to help

their clients with resources and referrals to other area agencies, youth programs for tutoring, mentoring and fun and special services to seniors. They accomplish their mission through a dedicated staff, a large, committed network of volunteers and support organizations and financial and food donations from the government and supporters.

St. Timothy's is proud to have been an active supporter for Monument Crisis Center since they were founded. In addition to our financial support, we hold our Christmas Food Box drive every November and take donated groceries and fresh fruit, herbs and vegetables (Garv Hunt

### **OPTIONS RECOVERY SERVICES**





Options Recovery Services provides healing for "the least of the least - the poor, the addicted, the mentally ill, and criminals - with supportive housing and treatment centers in San Leandro, Berkeley, West Oakland, Concord and soon Richmond. Options provides state of the art treatment, with 64% of its clients benefitting from the program (the next highest in the state is 34%). Options has special housing for mothers with children, and for the men coming out of the Offender Mentor Certification Program.

"The 50 (https://www.the50film.com/) is a documentary that asks how a group so underestimated became agents of radical change and the first men to become California certified counselors while inmates of that same state's prison system. We step alongside these men in an exploration of trauma, redemption, and the humanity of their stories.

## SUPPORT MINISTRIES

### CONTRA COSTA INTERFAITH COALITION



St. Timothy's became involved with CCIC last year when Tania joined their board. You may have seen posters and announcements asking for gently used furniture, kitchen utensils, and linens on an ongoing basis.

Case workers from over 20 Contra Costa County social service agencies provide a Needs List for their clients that is then filled by CCIC volunteers. Most items on the list are sourced through

donations but financial support is needed to purchase mattresses, blankets and food cards.

CCIC's mission is to help those in need, and by extension it keeps usable items from going into the landfill. In addition, volunteers sourcing donations often meet people at stressful times as they are moving or liquidating a loved one's estate. Picking up those donations and having them go to good use is another wonderful result. Volunteers are needed, especially drivers (each week drivers are asked if/when they are available).

Guests are provided enriching life experiences in the community as well as the opportunity to develop and maintain friendships with peers.

### GAIA GLOBAL HEALTH

Despite a record-breaking cyclone, the largest natural disaster Malawi has experienced in its recorded history, GAIA continues to fulfill Bill Rankin's and Charles Wilson's vision. Begun in 2000, to address the Aids crisis in Malawi, GAIA now addresses and is impacting not only Aids, but is building a workforce to address today's needs and tomorrow's, with:



- Nursing Scholars Program, supporting 236 scholars across the nations, serving local health posts and hospitals across Malawi.
- Mobil Health Clinic Program serving 35 sites across 3 districts, providing 222.104 client visits, all within an hour's walk.
- Ana Patsagoio Program (Children First) serving 8,142 children living with HIV by supplying them with life-saving anti-retroviral therapy.

Hunger by hosting an annual meal packaging event in our Parish Hall. Rise Against Hunger brings supplies and equipment, we provide the volunteer workers and donations.

In one fast-paced morning, over 80 volunteers package up to 20,000 meals through an assembly-line process to create fortified, shelf-stable meals that are distributed to areas of food insecurity around the world. Volunteers of all ages are welcome. We have a job for

everyone! The Meal Packaging Event is a fun, hands-on way to help those suffering from hunger.

### **WINTER NIGHTS SHELTER**





Winter Nights Family Shelter is a rotating homeless shelter that uses the facilities and helping hands of over 20 faith organizations to provide shelter for homeless families from October through June. Those served by the program move every two weeks from one congregation to the next during this period. The program serves those most at risk in the cold weather: families with children. St. Timothy's has hosted Winter Nights families in our Parish Hall since 2005. For two weeks each year, we provide meals, showers, homework help and space for play and relaxation. Transportation, counseling and other services are provided by the Winter Nights program. The mission of the program is to break the cycle of homelessness and move families toward self-sufficiency and stable housing.

### **ADOPT-A-FAMILY BIKES**

In 2001, Helen Coleman repaired the first used bikes we received to be given to clients of Monument Crisis Center (part of their Adopt-a-Family holiday program). In 2002 we did a bike drive at Baldwin Elementary and a dad stepped in to help fix up the 35 bikes. The next year it was 75. From that point on, AAFB (operating under the 501 c 3 of St. Timothy's)

became a holiday season program with volunteers and donations coming from the local community. Initially the program was run at St. Timothy's but as it grew, it moved out into donated space; a new location each year.

AAFB has been able to fund operations with donations from the community. Bike parts, helmets and locks are the main expenses. St. Timothy's provides much needed bookkeeping to process donations and pay expenses, stores all the

parts and supplies, and provides use of the copiers for receipts, flyers, and bike tags. In 2022 AAFB distributed over 301 bikes to local Title 1 schools, non-profits, and through social workers in our own school district.
