Sermon Notes: July 23, 2023

Focus: James the Great Lectionary Readings

There are different people named James in the Bible. Personally, I never really spent that much time thinking about this James as an individual, so below are the broad strokes of his life that I learned, some biblical references, and the specific details about how this James colors the experience of pilgrims on the Santiago de Compostela in Spain.

**Close relationship with Jesus** James, along with his brother John, had a special relationship with Jesus. They were among the few disciples present at the Transfiguration.

**Fisherman** James and John worked as fishermen with their father Zebedee on the Sea of Galilee. They left the family business to become disciples.

**Apostles** James was one of the twelve apostles chosen by Jesus to be his closest followers. He was part of the inner circle of disciples, which included Peter, James, and John.

**Son of Thunder** Jesus nicknamed James and his brother John "Boanerges," which means "Sons of Thunder" -- passionate and zealous.

**Witness** James witnessed miracles, such as the raising of Jairus' daughter and the healing of the blind Bartimaeus.

**Ambitious** James, along with his brother John, once asked Jesus for a position of honor in Jesus' kingdom. This request maddened the other disciples.

**Martyrdom** James became the first apostle to be martyred for his faith. He was executed by King Herod Agrippa I, who ordered his beheading around 44 CE.

**Spain** According to tradition, James preached the Gospel in Spain after Jesus' ascension. His attributed mission to Spain contributes to his veneration as the patron saint of Spain.

**Scallop shell symbolism** Pilgrims on the Camino de Santiago often wear or carry scallop shells as a sign of their pilgrimage and devotion to James. See even more detail at the end about this symbol.

#### **Biblical references**

# Calling of James and John

Mark 1:19-20; Matthew 4:21-22

James and his brother John were called by Jesus while they were mending their nets for the family business by the Sea of Galilee.

# Witnessing the Transfiguration

Mark 9:2-8; Matthew 17:1-9; Luke 9:28-36

James was with Peter and John to witness the Transfiguration.

## **Request for Positions of Honor**

Mark 10:35-45; Matthew 20:20-28

James and his brother John, through their mother, requested positions of honor in Jesus' kingdom.

## Jesus predicts of James' Martyrdom

Mark 10:39 (related to the one just before this)

James and John's ask to be glorified by Jesus. He says they will see glory by sharing in his suffering and death.

### **Garden of Gethsemane**

Mark 14:32-42; Matthew 26:36-46; Luke 22:39-46

He was with Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane before his arrest.

### **Post-Resurrection**

1 Corinthians 15:7

Paul writes that James was part of the group to whom Jesus appeared after his resurrection.

#### Death

Acts 12:1-2

King Herod arrested and killed James.

**Getting into weeds and scallops** the scallop shell is a symbol of James

The scallop shell is a symbol for pilgrims traveling to the shrine of St. James in Santiago de Compostela, Spain. Pilgrims often wear a scallop shell as a badge or attach it to their backpacks to this day.

*Direction and Guidance:* The grooves or ridges on the scallop shell converge towards a central point. This symbolizes the many paths that pilgrims take on their way to Santiago de Compostela.

*Hospitality:* In medieval times, pilgrims often relied on the kindness of strangers for shelter and sustenance. The scallop shell became a symbol of hospitality, as pilgrims would use it to scoop water or food from local sources.

Resurrection and Baptism: The scallop shell's association with water and its shape resembling a baptismal font or vessel symbolizes spiritual rebirth and resurrection. We have a scallop shell at St. Timothy's specifically for baptism!

*Universalism:* The scallop shell transcends language and culture. It represents the diverse backgrounds of the pilgrims who come together on the Camino de Santiago.

I thought these biblical, social, and historical details were interesting and hope you enjoyed them too.
