We are fully into Lent. I am praying for you to find helpful reflection and spiritual growth. Lent is a time of self-examination, repentance, and renewal. Ashes

Fasting

You can fast from food, but also fast from harsh speech, despair, or any other ways you habitually distance yourself from others. Fasting is self-discipline of pattern breaking. With God's help, may you find freedom from behavior that holds you back from becoming your best self.



Charity Generosity is another key component of Lenten spirituality. By giving of our time, talents, and resources to those in need, we demonstrate the love and compassion of Christ. By building up others, our own foundation is made stronger. Working with the youth in late February was a service that really grounded me. We made cookies for Trinity Center and played silly games. It was right and good. We are all part of one human family and we are called to care for each other as Jesus cared for us.

The spirituality of Lent is a powerful reminder of our need for transformation and renewal. Through prayer, fasting, charity, silliness and dad jokes we seek to deepen our relationship with God and to become more fully the people God created us to be. As we move through the season, may we all be inspired to draw closer to God and to live out our faith with joy and gratitude. **Todd**

LENT INTO HOLY WEEK INTO EASTER



"Turn around" is the phrase that is often used during Lent. Be forgiven, set free of guilt or shame—real or imagined-that keeps us from recognizing all the God moments in our lives. Look up or around, change our perspectives and we might see how the Spirit is moving in us and in others. If we are on a journey, then where are we going? Some might say to the cross and sacrificial living, yes—and more. We know the story of death and we tell the story of resurrection—and then even the gift of the power of the Spirit that sends us into the lives of others. There are two main components - Steering and Listening


The plan is to give everyone in the church a voice. We want to deepen our love of God, work together to create a loving and welcoming church open to all, and to discern what God wants us to do and what we need in order to move into our future.

The Steering Team members are the chief diffusers of innovation and guide the spiritual discernment process. They engage in critical listening and reflecting with the congregation and broader community.

Steering team is driven by 5 people and Linda C. Their main focus this year is to host a "St. Timothy's Journey of Faith" (from the time we were planted and going forward) after Easter where we will share our stories and build on our past for our future. We will have a fun process to share favorite highlights, lowlights and notable milestones of your journey with St Timothy's and your family.

The Listening Team plays an important role in the first phase of Vital and Thriving and will be organized by Jim C. The team will conduct "Community Discovery Interviews" and create a "Community Discovery Report" about our parish.

There will be confidential one-on-one interviews conducted by eight listening team members. These interviews will only be seen by a professional group, who will also look at our San Ramon Valley demographics. The two teams (steering and listening) are essential for helping us build a coherent and achievable future. There will be a long period where nothing seems to be happening and then things will start happening quickly!



LENT MADNESS


The format is straightforward: 32 saints are placed into a tournament-like single elimination bracket. Each pairing remains open for a set period of time and people vote for their favorite saint. 16 saints make it to the Round of the Saintly Sixteen; eight advance to the Round of the Elate Eight; four make it to the Faithful Four; two to the Championship; and the winner is awarded the coveted Golden Halo. The first round consists of basic biographical information about each of the 32 saints. 

Between World Wars I and II, the six Mitford sisters – each beautiful, brilliant and eccentric – dominated the English political, literary and social scenes. As the Nazis rise in power, novelist Nancy Mitford grows suspicious of two of her sisters' constant visits to Germany and the high-ranking fascist company they keep. When she overhears alarming conversations and uncovers disquieting documents, Nancy must make painful choices between the personal and the political as Great Britain goes to war with Germany.

Marie Benedict (aka successful lawyer Heather Terrell) is the well know author of such novels as: *The Only Woman in the Room* (about Hedy LaMarr), *Lady Clementine, The Mystery of Mrs. Christie*, and *The Personal Librarian* (biracial librarian for Andrew Carnegie) brings her investigation and story-telling skills to Nancy Mitford and her sisters who dominated the news and society in England between The Wars.

 - **2022** started out with a projected deficit of \$120,000+. The budget ended with a surplus of \$84,000+. The vestry voted to allocate the surplus to the pledge reserve.
 - 2023 The vestry approved budget for 2023 appears in the 2022 Annual Report. It anticipates income of \$720,000 and expenses are \$796,700. We currently anticipate a deficit of \$76,000.
